The [Lancaster Gazette](#) was established by George Sanderson and Benjamin Oswald on April 4, 1826, in Lancaster, the seat of Fairfield County, Ohio. It was the organ of the Whig Party and competed directly with the Democratic [Ohio Eagle](#), which was the county's first paper, having published its first issue in 1807. Fairfield County was predominantly Democratic, and despite its minority political affiliation, and the number of changes in ownership, editorship, and name that the *Gazette* would experience over the next century, the weekly publication gradually increased in both size and popularity. Eventually, it achieved circulation numbers that surpassed all but a few of Ohio's county papers.

In 1852, under the leadership of George Weaver, the paper became known as the *Weekly Lancaster Gazette*. The *Gazette* supported the Know-Nothing or American Party for a short time starting in 1855, changing its name to the *American Lancaster Gazette*. The new masthead incorporated a portrait of President George Washington and included one of his quotes as a motto: "Place None but Americans on Guard." After the 1856 Republican National Convention, the paper began to support the Republican Party. In 1859, Robert M. Clarke and John M. Sutphen took over the paper and a new motto appeared across the masthead: "When the Press Compromises Truth, it Ceases to be the Guardian of Liberty." Their

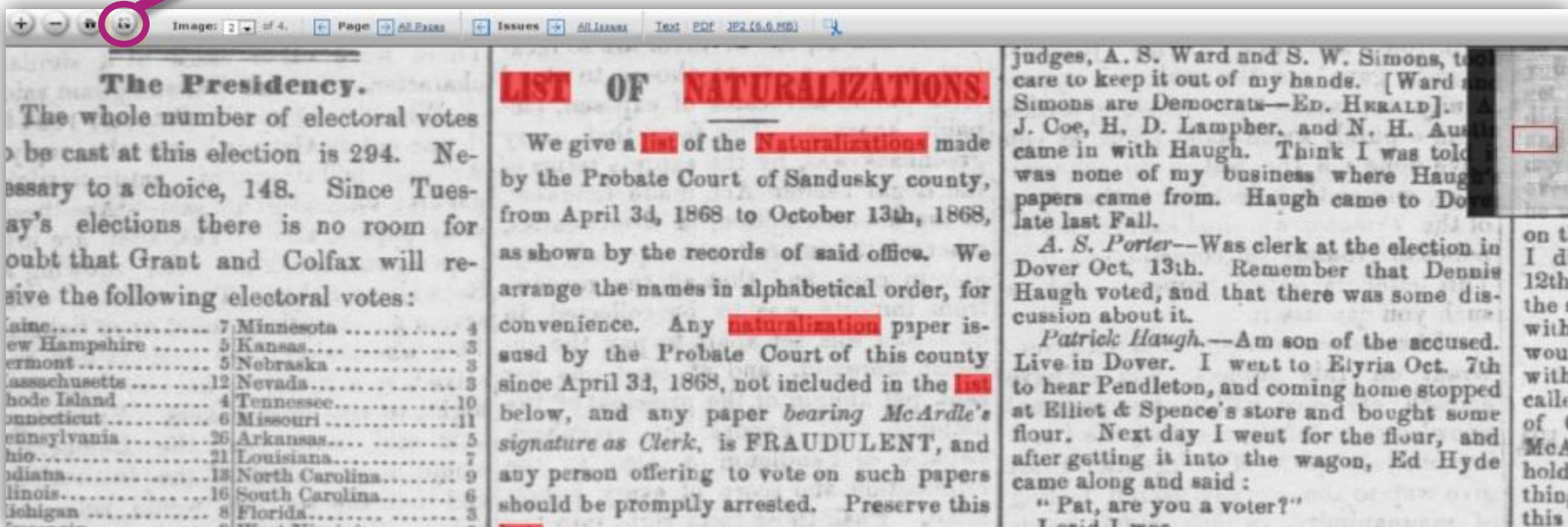
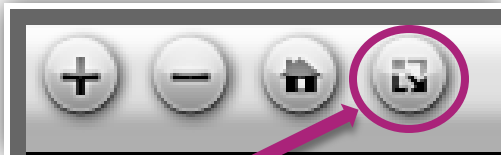

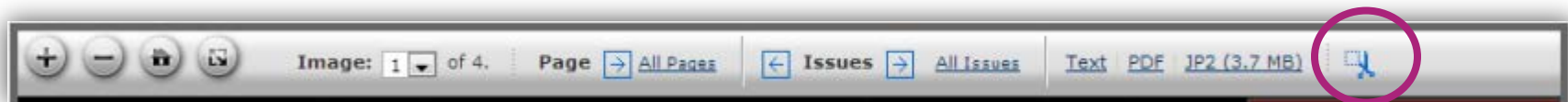

Keyword Searching

- Computer generated
- Captures printing accuracies...and errors
- Thrown off by imperfections on page
- May require more than one search to find information



Even More Search Tips

- Use state and date limiters
- Use many words to characterize the topic
- Too many results?
 - Use more specific terms
 - Use limits in combination
- Too few results?
 - Use alternate terms and broader subjects
 - Relax limits



Historical Newspapers

- 18th and 19th Century Papers
 - Often partisan, supporting specific political agendas
 - More than one paper in each town, county or region
 - Paper may report on local news from areas within its circulating area, beyond city of publication
 - Fewer pictures/graphical elements



Historical Newspapers



- Late 19th, 20th and 21st Century Papers
 - More graphics and prominent headlines
 - Engagement and marriage announcements, obituaries more common
 - Coverage of churches, schools, police/court reports

Special Newspapers

- Focused on news of particular groups or organizations

IDENTIFY PRISONER IN COUNTY JAIL AS AN EX-CONVICT AND NOW UNDER PAROLE FROM PEN

Bertillion Officer From Ohio Penitentiary Identifies T. E. Lang In The County Jail As Howard Wolfe, Who Was Sent Up From Franklin County For Burglary; Important Evidence Is Discovered By Officers On Saturday Morning.

The Court of Common Pleas opened Friday morning at 9 o'clock. Sheriff Altekruze brought Joseph A. Kline, convicted of murder in the second degree into the court room, and the Prosecutor, Henry W. Harter, moved that the sentence of the law be immediately passed upon him. Kline was ordered to stand up and say what if anything, he had to say as to why the sentence of the law should not be passed upon him. He responded in a tremulous voice that he had nothing to say.

The court then sentenced him to imprisonment for life, and to pay the costs of the prosecution. The following is a verbatim report of the sentence as delivered by Judge Meyer:

REFORMATORY

Will Be the Address of Five Prisoners Sentenced by Judge Ambler Saturday—One Goes to the Works.

Seven of the defendants indicted by the January grand jury appeared before Judge Ambler Saturday morning and entered pleas of guilty to their respective charges. Five of this number were sentenced to the Mansfield reformatory. Prosecutor Charles Trichbaum and Assistant Prosecutor Hubert Pontius represented the state. Frank Snooks, aged 19, who claims Youngstown as his home, charged with grand larceny, acknowledged stealing \$174 from the cigar stand at the Courtland hotel, in April, 1908. He received a Mansfield reformatory sentence.

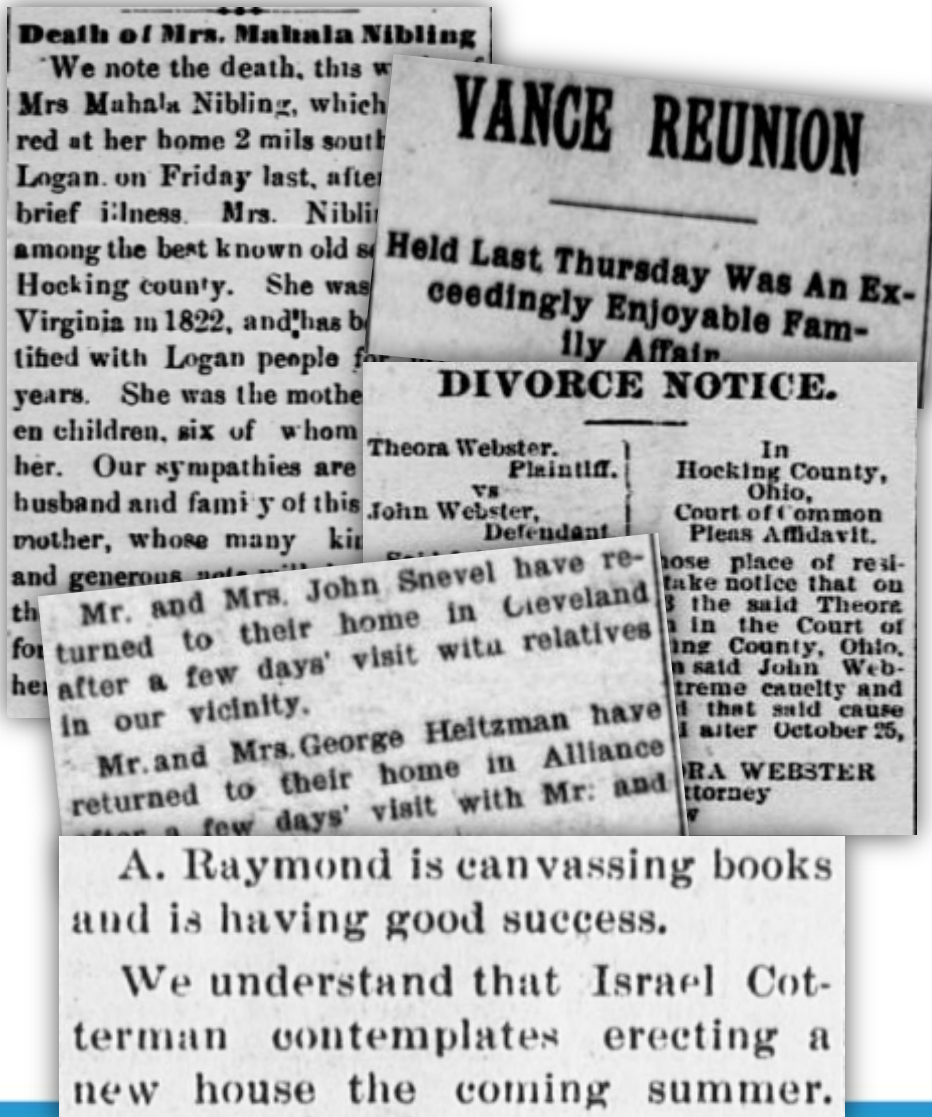

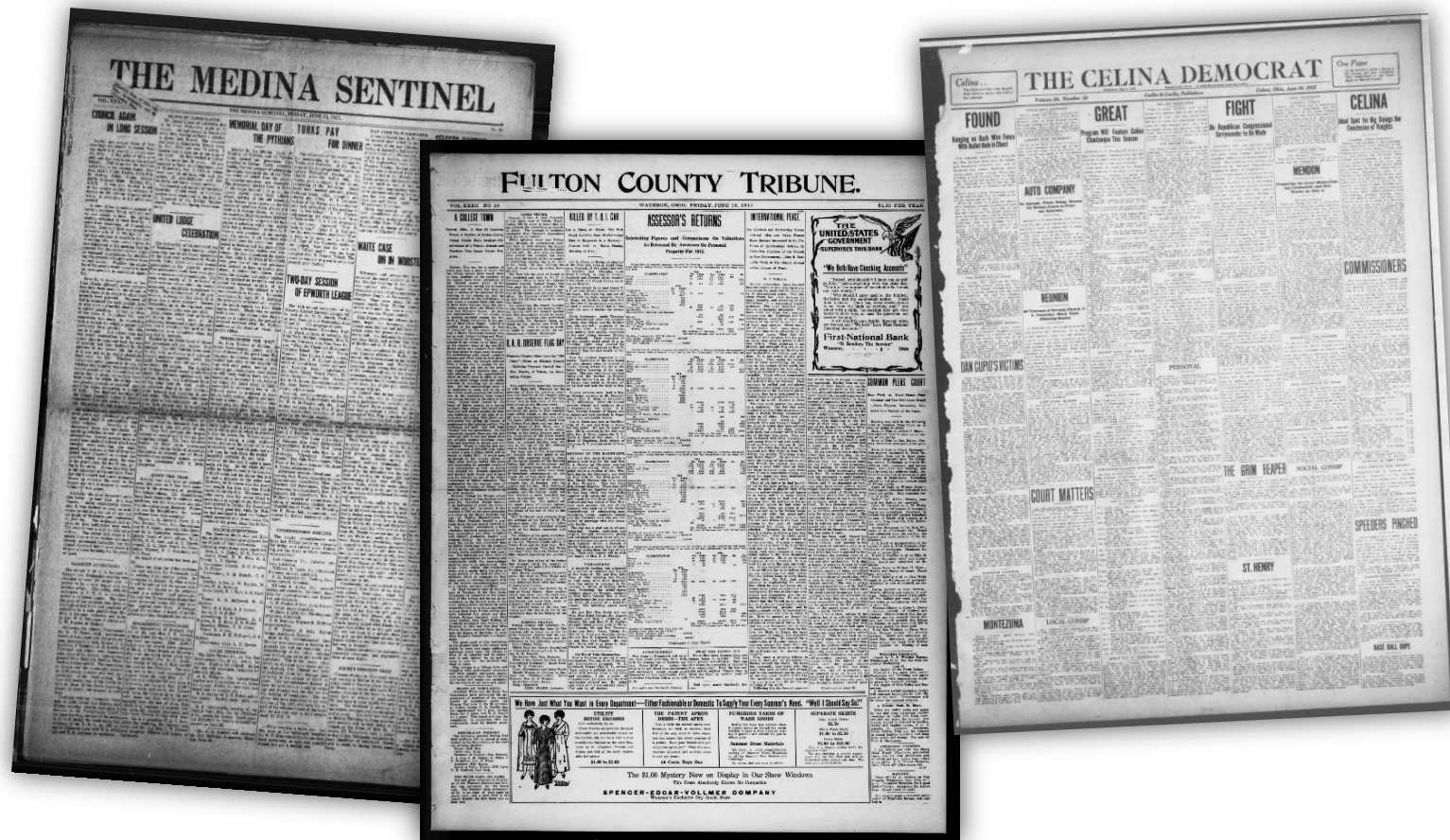

Plans are on the verge of adoption to convert the buildings on the grounds of the State Institution for Feeble-minded Youth into a combined home for the indigent blind and a state hospital for crippled children, and to transfer the imbecile children to the state custodial farm at Morgan's station.

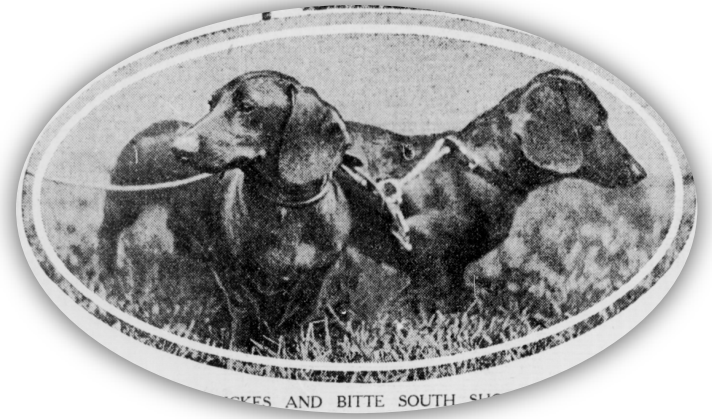
